***Remember:** To see if a book is a "just-right" fit for you, pick a page to read and hold up 5 fingers. Then, put down a finger every time you come to a word you don't know. If you put down all 5 fingers, the book is too hard. Otherwise, it is just right!*

Choose any non-fiction book on a topic that interests you. The book must be at your "just-right" reading level. Read the book and fill out the attached sheet.



Fiction Choice:

Choose any fiction book from any genre that you enjoy. The book must be at your "just-right" reading level. Read the book and fill out the attached sheet.

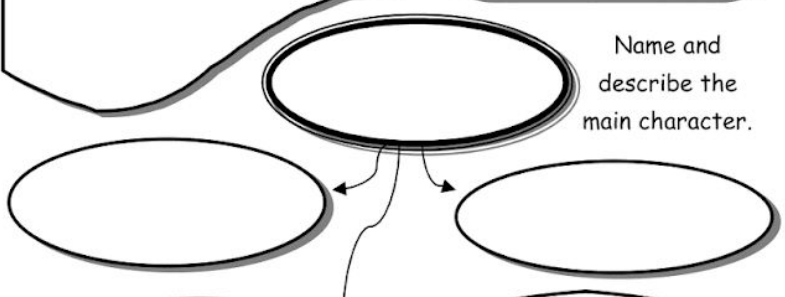
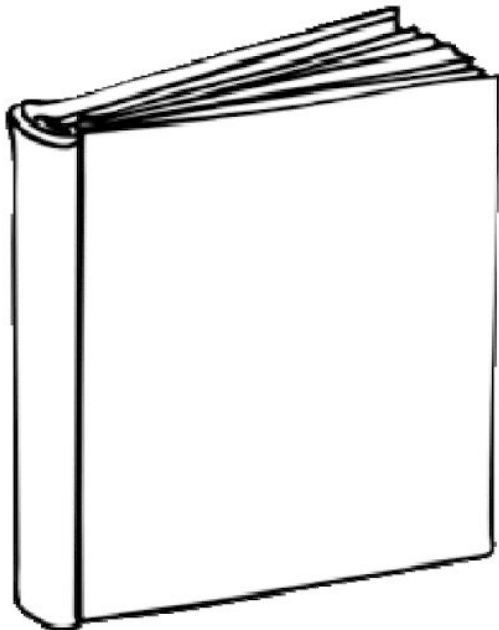

Select **ONE** of the projects below based on your Must-Read Book Selection. Complete the project and practice a two-five minute presentation. You will present your book to the class using your project.

*Design a diorama depicting a scene from your story. On the outside of your box, write and display the title and author, characters/character traits, story events, problem and solution.

*Pretend you are a character in your book. Design a postcard to "send" to another character. Your postcard should include an illustration of an important place or event on one side and a letter to the character on the other. You will need to put yourself in your character's shoes and write what you think this character would say. Your letter must be two well-developed paragraphs.

*Make a collage using photographs, pictures and words from magazines, newspapers, or catalogs. Each item you include on your collage should be related to your story in some way. Be sure to include the title and author.

*Create a timeline of important events from your story. Decorate the timeline with illustrations of your events, setting, and characters. Be sure to include the title and author.

*Design puppets and a set and play out an important scene from the book. Remember that your audience will need some information before you present your play.

*Make a mobile. Be sure to include all the elements.

*Create a scrapbook or photo album of your book. Be sure to include all the elements.

*Make a "treasure box" out of a shoe box. On the outside, make it look like a treasure box, complete with straps and a buckle/clasp. On the inside, make or find at least five items related to your story. Put the items in the box, along with an index card description of each item and its importance your story.
